CRM EXTRACTION IN ENVIRONMENTALLY PROTECTED AREAS: how to reconcile two, sometimes conflicting, societal objectives and needs: protecting environmentally sensitive areas and increasing socio-economic resilience.

What's new on the narratives

They are somehow similar to others that have been articulated in the past, in relation to other industries or, more generally, to other development policies and infrastructures.

The novelty, now, is that Europe is not facing a development problem but a threat to its pillars. And for that reason, European leaders need to go far beyond what they have done in dealing with the populations, seeing as older techniques and strategies may not work – not because they are wrong, but because of the severely limited timeframe that Europe now disposes of to implement the different transition processes.

Patterns in the narratives

- Correlation between contestation-acceptance and the distance that the 'author' of the narrative is from the place of intervention.
- Environmentalist movements are 'stuck' in a contradiction.

Main narratives

- National Security and Geopolitical Concerns
- Sustainable and Responsible Sourcing
- Economic Competitiveness and Innovation
- Supply Chain Resilience and Risk Management
- Circular Economy and Resource Efficiency

- The population's fear of change is exploited in the political arena.
 - The disappointment of the populations on how Europe has evolved.

Stake holder's narratives

• Environmental interest groups & NGOs emphasises the negative environmental impacts of raw materials extraction, and advocates for sustainability, responsible resource management, and the protection of the environment.

• Policy-makers narrative both at national
